### FROM THE SELECT BOARD

The Select Board has the responsibility to support and coordinate all aspects of our town government. One of the ways we do this is by convening forums where all boards, committees and department heads meet to exchange information about their current priorities and challenges. The most recent forum held on January 8, 2024 with boards/committees and department heads discussed updates, leadership succession, and records storage and digitizing. What the Select Board learned from this forum was the importance of meeting and sharing information, the need for proper records storage, and future interest and goal for the town to digitize records. The Planning Board identified how they are utilizing help from the Pioneer Valley Planning Commission to professionalize their group and focus on processes so future members can better understand how the Planning Board functions.

The Select Board under the guidance of the IT Advisory Group is taking steps to significantly improve our town's Information Technology infrastructure. The email system update to give some employees/volunteers new official emails has begun thanks to Calm Computing. All staff will be trained on Microsoft 365 as needed. The Select Board has also agreed to move forward with Montague Web Works for a new town website and we are waiting to see a mockup version to begin discussions.

Progress continued with a meeting held in January with Town of Amherst Officials regarding engineering and surveying work for the Sewer extension project on Jones, Cadwell, and portion of South Valley Rd. We are happy to report that the survey work is well underway. Also in the Village Center, Berkshire Design Group continues to work with the Planning Board and Select Board on sidewalk designs for Amherst Road.

The Amethyst Brook Apartments housing project is about 11% completed. Other construction which is occurring further East on Amherst Road is for the Amherst water treatment plant. Please remember to drive carefully due to construction equipment, tractor trailers, and cement trucks, etc. that may be

staging in the road and the construction workers that need to access both sites by vehicle or on foot.

The records storage project at the Rhodes Building continues with phase 1 which involves sorting through and labeling records in the basement. At this point there are only a few boards/committees/departments that still need to identify documents/materials to be shredded, recycled, or saved. We look forward to scheduling a shred truck where those town materials can be disposed of properly and potentially offering the shredding service to all Pelham residents if allowed. Future phases will involve purging old furniture; tables, desks, chairs, racks; and IT equipment which have been stored for a very long time, and organizing the spaces downstairs so that it can be used for urgently needed record storage. ### **Recent Grant Awards**

The Police Department is excited to announce a recent grant award for our town.

The Pelham Police Department and Emergency Management applied for and received a grant through the MA Emergency Management Agency for a MetLite Transport Skid for our existing UTV. Delivery was accepted in March. This a great addition to our UTV. This skid will be deployed for situations that include missing/lost/injured hikers, accessing individuals that may need extrac-



tion in an area a traditional vehicle cannot reach, and to move first responders with more ease to hard to reach locations.

Brett accepted a police officer position with the Chicopee Police Department earlier this year, and we wish him the best of luck. Lock boxes are available to older adults in Pelham. A lock box is a small secure box with a combination that holds your house key. The location and combination will be on file with the Pelham Police Department and the Dispatch Center. When an emergency call comes in, the dispatcher informs the responding officer or paramedic of the lock box location and combination via a secure format. This allows the officer quick entry to offer assistance. A member of the Pelham Police Department installs the box free of charge. This

program is a collaboration of the Hampshire County Sheriff's Office, the Pelham Police Department, and the Pelham Council on Aging. To request a lock box, call Tracy Osbahr at 413-531-9678.



### **HOUSING COMMITTEE UPDATES**

Welcome Newcomers! Last year HC members delivered over 60 "Welcome to Pelham" packets to Pelham residents who moved here during 2020-2022. Inside the 10 x 13" hand-delivered envelope was a file folder containing a 24-page booklet with information about Pelham's town government, including town boards & committees, Pelham's fire & police departments, the Pelham Library and the elementary school, some historical "Fast Facts," demographic information, how to find six of our recreational/hiking trails, and lots more.

The "Welcome to Pelham" file folder also included the popular "What to Do with Your Stuff" manual, produced by the Sustainability Committee, a brochure by the Pelham Historical Society, including photos of historic sites in town, a "Quick Contacts List," important dates & town events, a calendar of committee meetings, and a "Resources for Seniors" flyer produced by Pelham's Council on Aging (COA).

### **BOARD OF HEALTH NEW OFFICE HOURS**

The Board of Health recently adopted private well regulations. These regulations apply to new well construction, require annual water quality testing of wells that supply rental properties and a test when a property changes hands. The regulations can be found on the Board of Health section of the Town website. Though water quality testing is not required for existing wells, and can be complicated, the Board of Health suggest at least a basic water test every few years. If you have specific concerns contact the Board of Health for advice. Mass Department of Environmental Protection has the private well testing guidance on the website,

**Also the Board of Health now has office hours at the Rhodes Building every Tuesday from 12:30-4:30PM** with new staff member Desiree Vennert of the Quabbin Health District. Desiree can help residents file permits applications, find septic system plans and answer questions.

### **COMMUNITY PRESERVATION COMMITTEE**

### **COME TO OUR MEETINGS!**

The Community Preservation Committee (CPC) meets on every third Thursday of the month from 6 to 7:30 pm. Our meetings are open to the public and can be attended virtually by finding the agenda and Zoom link on the *MyTownGovernment site* for Pelham. (mytowngovernment.org/01002).

### **RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE COMMITTEE**

The Community Preservation Committee (CPC) administers a state/town-funded program under the state Community Preservation Act (CPA). The program is funded through an annual 3% surcharge on each property owner's tax bill. The state annually matches, dollar for dollar, the funds collected by the town from the surcharge at a variable total percentage.

The CPC is authorized to fund town-meeting-approved projects that meet town needs in the areas of Open Space and Recreation, Historic Preservation, and Community Housing. At least 10% of each year's income from the combined town surcharge and state match must be reserved for each of the three authorized areas of town needs. CPC funds can accumulate and be spent over future years.

- State Match for FY2023: \$80,487.00 (based on FY22 local surcharge collections) Local Surcharge for FY2023: \$87,816.53
- State Match for FY2024: \$87,922.00 (based on FY23 local surcharge collections)
- Local Surcharge for FY2024: This will be reported in November after all property tax collections through June 30 have been calculated.

### PLANNING BOARD UPDATES

Although the Planning Board will not be presenting any zoning changes or other articles for consideration at annual town meeting this spring, progress is being made on several fronts:

In order to enhance efficiency, continuity, and professionalization of the Board, we have contracted with the Pioneer Valley Planning Commission to engage a part time planning staffer to work in town on two Fridays per month at the Rhodes Building. Kyle Finnell is also working with us to complete the up date of zoning and town bylaws under a technical assistance grant from PVPC. We will bring the update to town meeting for approval of a new and easier to read set of bylaws as soon as possible. Regulations for the operation of the Planning Board will be final ized in April or early May. The goal of all this activity is to ensure that, as membership changes, new mem bers elected to the Planning Board will have clear process and legal information available to ensure that efforts already underway are not wasted or the rea soning and discussions for positions lost. Judy Eiseman continues as PVPC Representative and Pete Wilson is the Alternate member representing Pelham at the regional planning agency.

Along with the Select Board and other town officials, the Board continues to monitor and provide input into the design and location for sidewalks on Amherst Road. We expect public hearings to be held in the not too distant future, but if anyone has strong opinions or desires on the matter, please be in contact with the Board! Surveys for sewer lines are also underway and the Board may be involved if these impact property lines.

The volunteer Working Group established by the Board has made inquiries into possible uses for the town-owned lot at 4 South Valley Road. These will be discussed at town meeting along with the Planning Board's views and possible recommendations for further action. The Board has had both a wetlands survey and boundary survey of the parcels owned by the town (including school, library, community center parcels) for clarity in the review process in order to ascertain whether any use might be financially and/or

otherwise beneficial to the town.

For the safety of the Regional School students, the Planning Board, along with the Board of Health and Conservation Commission, has reiterated its support for a natural grass playing field and opposition to the use of artificial turf because of the environmental and economic costs for using PFAS laden materials.

As always, communication among townspeople is a major goal. Anne Stoddard will take on responsibility for representing the Board on the Community Preservation Committee for the foreseeable future. We value the input of the Housing Committee, Con servation Commission, and Energy Committee mem bers in the ongoing discussions about various issues that overlap with the Planning Board's role.

### SUSTAINABILITY COMMITTEE WORK & PROJECTS

The group first began as the Sustainability Working Group in 2021, becoming an official town board in 2023 and is now called the Sustainability Committee. Our original purpose as a working group was to develop Pelham-specific information that helped us reduce, reuse, recycle, and reimagine what to do with things we no longer wanted or needed. In the spring of 2022, we produced the first *What To Do With Our Stuff* manual, a practical, handy booklet that indexed where one could take no longer needed "stuff". Hard copies are available in the library and an electronic copy can be found on the town website under Announcements and the Sustainability Committee link.

As we develop our own ever-evolving focuses, we are currently working on the growing dilemma of plastic waste by promoting the idea of moving towards zero waste in our community. To that end we:

- Updated the "Stuff" manual to reflect the ongoing changes in recycling
- Held a workshop and strategy swap, Working Towards Zero Waste, 9/9/23 at the library
- Begun amassing new research on zero waste products, what online companies and local

stores sell these products, websites that rate the companies and what you can do yourself with the information

\*Our research will be made available at the Library in spring 2024.

### Future projects include:

- ⇒ Cosponsoring a Repair Café with the Library
- ⇒ Working with the Library on items for the Library of Things such as electric yard tools
- ⇒ Encouraging collaboration with other town boards and groups to promote sustainable practices
- ⇒ Increasing public discourse on how to make the town more sustainable


