FROM THE SELECT BOARD OFFICE

Town Meeting

The Annual Town Meeting on Saturday May 8, 2021 was again held outside under a tent on the Elementary School field due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Those that attended on that chilly morning wore masks, practiced social distancing, and adhered to the seating configuration with household members. The Citizen's Petition to have all dogs leashed at all times inspired many residents to speak about the article. Ultimately after long discussion, the original petitioners who submitted the article removed it from the Warrant. Conservation Commission Chair Dana MacDonald who was present spoke about working with the Select Board to organize a public forum where the dog leash law issues could be discussed further. Both forums were held this past July in the Ramsdell Room at the Community Building.

Town Office Re-Opens

After being closed to the public for about 15 months, the Town Offices/Rhodes Building re-opened on Monday June 7, 2021. At this time only one person will be helped inside the lobby at a time and all visitors will be asked to please continue to wear a mask.

New Platform for Posting Meeting Notices & Minutes

The homepage on <u>townofpelham.org</u> has been refreshed. The Select Board approved use of the MyTownGovernment platform which will enable designated board/committee members to post meeting notices and minutes on their own with easy navigation. Archived minutes and agendas will still be available on each board/committee page on the town website. Minutes and agendas starting on July 21, 2021 will be available at <u>mytowngovernment.org</u>.

Board/Committee Meetings During Pandemic

Governor Baker's Executive Order effective March 12, 2020, which suspended certain provisions of the Open Meeting Law due to the pandemic and allowed Boards/Committees to meet virtually, was extended on June 16, 2021. Going forward all Boards/Committees will have the option to either meet in-person, entirely remotely, or meet as a hybrid of the two; in-person with virtual connection provided. Mosquito Spraying Application

Pelham's recent application to opt-out of the State's mosquito spraying program was denied along with several other moderate-risk communities in the Commonwealth. State Senator Comerford and Representative Domb were disappointed with the decision and have communicated with the State advocating for local cities/towns. Looking forward, the Select Board voted to create a warrant article for Fall Special Town Meeting seeking authorization to join the Pioneer Valley Mosquito Control District. Being a member is an acceptable plan for opting out of the State's mosquito spraying program and will implement a monitoring program for mosquito borne illnesses in the town.

Grant Updates

Two best practice grants were awarded from the State's Community Compact Cabinet for an IT Assessment and HR Wage and Compensation Study which are both underway. The IT Assessment will provide a clearer picture of town wide use and practices related to Information Technology with recommendations. The Wage Study will provide a fair and competitive grading scale for current and future employees and will help ensure that Pelham's wages are competitive with other surrounding communities in order to retain current staff and attract candidates to our lovely town. A special thank you to all town employees involved who dedicated additional time and effort to complete the requested documentation.

CELEBRATE WOMEN: THIRD INSTALLMENT FROM PHS

MARGARET MORSE NICE (1883-1974)

Daughter of Amherst College Professor Anson D. Morse and Margaret Duncan Morse, she became a professional ornithologist and a pioneer female ethologist (the study of animals in their wild habitat), with close ties to Pelham. Her father purchased 203 acres around a rocky knoll he named "Grey Rocks" and built a second home that local residents referred to as "The Castle" (still standing at the extreme end of Arnold Road).

Grey Rocks was much more a second, rather than a summer home. This is demonstrated by its use as the location for of all the Morse daughters, birthplace of all the Morse grandchildren, and the address used by the two Morse sons and one daughter, who listed Pelham as the residence from which they enlisted in the armed forces in World War I.

As a young child, Margaret demonstrated the ability to make close observations and take detailed notes of the behavior of her family's flock of chickens - right down to "who pecked who." Her exposure to the forests and fields around Grey Rocks led her to shift her skills to the study and documentation of the behavior of wild birds. Her Grey Rock studies led to several papers specific to Pelham: *Blackburnian, Myrtle and Black-throated Warblers with their Young; Magnolia Warblers in Pelham; Nesting Behavior of Ovenbirds, Pelham;* and *Summer Birds of Pelham.*

In the course of her professional career she became a member and served as an officer of several U.S. national ornithological societies. She published over 250 studies of bird behavior and was made an honorary member of British, Finnish, German, Dutch, and Swiss ornithological organizations. In 1997 the U.S. Wilson Ornithological Society honored Margaret by creating an annual award in her name.

Robert Lord Keyes' historical narrative on the "Castle," a part of the Pelham file (PEL 93) in the Massachusetts Historical Commission in Boston, was an important source for this summary, as were several accounts of Margaret's life in the Internet. In 2007, the Pelham Historical Commission, led by Joseph S. Larson, then Chairman, requested that "Grey Rocks" be certified as the official name of the rocky knob at the end of Arnold Road and it now appears as an official designation on all U.S. Geological Survey Maps.

BOARD OF HEALTH INFORMATION



Though things are starting to return to a pre-pandemic conditions, there are still reasons to take some precautions. The emerging Delta Variant is 1,000 times more infectious than the original and even people that are vaccinated are being infected. Not everybody is or can get vaccinated, in particular young children are still vulnerable. So keep a mask handy and use it in crowded conditions when you are indoors, wash you hands frequently, and if you haven't already, please get vaccinated.

WATER QUALITY TESTING FOR YOUR WELL

It is the recommendation of the Department of Environmental Protection that you periodically have your well water tested. A basic test should include lead, arsenic, coliform bacteria, sodium, nitrates, iron and manganese. A basic well water test should cost between \$100 and \$200. PFAS TESTING

Almost 40 people have had there wells tested and the results are starting to come in and so far they are encouraging. If your well was part of the testing program it takes about a month get your results by email.

AVOIDING ARBOVIRUS

In the summer we all like to enjoy the outdoors but please protect yourself. Mosquitoes can transmit arbovirus such as Eastern Equine Encephalitis (EEE) and ticks can transmit Lyme Disease.

HOW TO PROTECT YOURSELF:


- 1.) Use EPA-registered insect repellent
- 2.) Wear long sleeve clothing and treat clothing and gear with 0.5% Permethrin, which is an insecticide. Do not use Permethrin directly on skin
- 3.) Check not only your clothing for ticks but your skin too after outdoor exposure in your yard or woods
- 4.) Avoid being outdoors from dusk to dawn when mosquitoes are the most active
- 5.) Remove standing water from your yard
- 6.) Use mosquito netting to protect children in strollers/carriers
- 7.) Avoid wooded and brushy areas with high grass and leaf litter
- 8.) Walk in the center of trails

HOW TO PROTECT YOUR PETS:

- 1.) Consult with your Vet about animal safe mosquito repellants and other preventative measures
- 2.) Avoid being outside with your pet from dusk to dawn when mosquitos are most active
- 3.) Remove standing water in your backyard
- 4.) Check doorways or animal entrances for any tears in screens

NEWS FROM THE ENERGY COMMITTEE

Many of you may have noticed construction at the Community Building this spring. We now have a completely new heating and ventilating system for this complex! The new system is a Variable Refrigerant Flow (VRF) heat pump -21^{st} century, all-electric technology that will aid Pelham in reducing our carbon footprint, save energy costs, and improve the heating and cooling in the building. This is the culmination of years of applying for grants to fund engineering studies, final engineering design of the best system, modifying the design to reduce costs, and then ap-



plying for grants to fund the actual purchase and installation. Those efforts resulted in getting two large grants from the state for installation of the system, although we were still short of the funds needed ensure success. Thanks to efforts of the Select Board, we not only got one grant extended due to COVID delays but we got an increased award – enabling the town to proceed!

Construction started in March. With the help of the Energy Committee, Rick Adamcek (DPW Superintendent), the Select Board, town staff, and George Kicza, Sr. (Clerk of the Works), the project remained on schedule. The system was started up in the last week of May. At this point, a few items remain to be addressed but the system is fully operational! The new system is designed to provide heating and cooling all year but, as a backup in case there are any problems with the new system, the existing oil heating system will remain operational.

Where do we go from here? If the town can get funding for solar panels on the school or over the library parking lot (hopefully one of the Energy Committee's next projects), the new system will provide zero carbon heating and cooling.

Special thanks go out to the staff in the library and to fire and police personnel who had to be flexible as construction activities invaded their work spaces. The Energy Committee also thanks Co-Chair Tony Rogers for tirelessly sheepherding this project through to completion over several years.

In other news, the Energy Committee would like to thank Tom Thompson for taking over as Pelham's representative, previously held by Karen Willard-Ribeiro, on the Inter-Municipal Task Force on Community Choice Aggregation. This hard-working team from Amherst, Northampton, and Pelham is developing a plan for the towns to potentially cooperate to take charge of their electricity supply, negotiate better prices with electricity generators and suppliers, and access state grant funding to invest in energy efficiency, renewable energy, and other community services. This means that towns can potentially lower their environmental impact from electricity consumption in their community while providing more affordable energy services. More updates to come in future Slate newsletters.

The Energy Committee is looking for new members – anyone with an interest in reducing Pelham's greenhouse gas emissions while keeping the town affordable for all is welcome!

COUNCIL ON AGING NEWS



The Pelham COA hopes to offer our annual flu clinic on October 13th from 1:00-3:00 in the Ramsdell Room at the Community Complex. While the flu can make anyone sick, people with long-term health conditions— such as asthma, diabetes (type 1 and 2) and heart disease—are at greater risk for serious complications from the flu. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention says an annual flu vaccine is the first and best way to guard against the flu. Come join us – and enjoy some snacks and company with Pelham friends and neighbors. Watch for an update – and look for a postcard with final details in the early fall.

Still waiting to have the COVID-19 vaccine?

CVS and Walgreens pharmacies in Amherst and Belchertown offer vaccines on both appointment and walk-in schedules, as do many local medical practices. Remember, the vaccine is free and available for anyone over 12 who lives, works, or studies in Massachusetts.

"Hi, it's Becky from Medicare." No, it isn't – but it is one of the latest scams that come through our phone lines. A robocaller named "Becky" will claim you are eligible for genetic testing to screen for diseases that Medicare will pay for. She will ask for your Medicare number and mailing address to send you a test kit with instructions. THIS IS A SCAM!! Medicare will never call you personally to offer genetic screening or any other test or treatment or device. These scammers want your Medicare number so they can bill the program for services you do not receive. These charges could result in Medicare denying you for services you actually need later on. Review your Medicare summary notices. Makes sure the dates and services listed are correct. If something does not look right, call your medical provider's office.

- A list of acceptable materials is available at the Transfer Station office and online at townofpelham.org or https://www.amherstma.gov/547/Hazardous-Special-Waste-Collections. **No latex/acrylic house paint will be accepted**
- The Town of Pelham will pay the participation fee for Pelham residents. Residents will be responsible for paying the full cost of the disposal. **Fees will apply for fluorescent bulbs \$1 per bulb**
- There is a per-household limit of 25 pounds or 25 gallons (or combination) of material. Automotive oil & batteries are not included in this limit. Larger amounts will be accepted by special advance arrangement only (call 413-259-3049).
